OPINION AND ORDER

Section 10d(6) of the Customer Choice and Electricity Reliability Act, 2000 PA 141, MCL 460.10d(6), required a portion of the cost savings resulting from electric utility securitization financing to be used as a source for funding for the Low-Income and Energy Efficiency Fund (LIEEF). Revenues generated under The Detroit Edison Company's interim rate relief order issued on February 20, 2004, and the Commission's final order issued on November 23, 2004 in Case No. U-13808, have also been devoted to this fund. In prior orders in the docket, the Commission established a framework for administering the LIEEF and procedures for considering specific proposals.

Previously, the Commission has awarded grants to 7 organizations totaling \$27.4 million on February 21, 2002; to 9 organizations totaling \$12.2 million on July 23, 2002; to 7 organizations totaling more than \$5 million on August 20 and September 16, 2002; to 4 organizations totaling

more than \$5 million on August 20 and September 16, 2002; to 4 organizations totaling up to \$20 million on December 20, 2002; to 4 organizations totaling up to \$20 million on February 27, 2003; to 8 organizations totaling nearly \$6.8 million on October 14, 2003; to 4 organizations totaling \$13 million on October 29, 2003; to eight organizations totaling \$20 million on October 14, 2004; to 8 organizations totaling \$8 million on October 22, 2004; to 6 organizations totaling \$15 million on January 2005; to 8 organizations totaling \$5 million on February 24, 2005; and to 11 organizations totaling \$6 million on June 30, 2005.

On August 31, 2005, the Commission invited organizations to submit proposals to provide energy assistance to low-income households. By the September 22, 2005 deadline, the following submitted proposals seeking a total of more than \$102 million: the Department of Human Services (DHS), Downriver Community Conference, Lakeshore Energy, Lighthouse Emergency Services, the Michigan Community Action Agency Association (MCAAA), Newaygo County Community Services (Newaygo County), North Kent Service Center, The Salvation Army, and The Heat and Warmth Fund (THAW).

The Commission expresses its appreciation to the applicants for providing thoughtful proposals. In awarding the grants, the Commission gave preference to organizations with a proven record in distributing energy assistance to low-income residents, an existing administrative structure to handle additional distribution activities, and the ability to coordinate assistance with other service providers and to serve multiple counties.

Based on its review of the applications, the Commission is awarding the following grants:

- DHS - \$26,525,000 in total. \$20,525,000 for the State Emergency Relief program and to prevent threatened shutoff of energy services and \$6,000,000 to restore energy services already disconnected.
- Downriver Community Conference - \$275,000 for energy assistance to low-income households in the Monroe and southern Wayne County areas.

- Lighthouse Emergency Services - \$200,000 to assist clients in the Pontiac and Oakland County areas who are ineligible for assistance from the DHS or for whom such assistance is insufficient or would not be provided in time to avert an emergency.
- MCAAA - \$4,500,000 in total. \$3,000,000 for low-income direct energy assistance, \$1,000,000 for deliverable fuels programs for low-income households, and \$500,000 to provide a 2:1 match for funds raised locally through the Walk for Warmth project.
- Newaygo County - \$500,000 to assist clients in a ten-county area ineligible for the State Emergency Relief Program or for whom such assistance is insufficient or would not be available in time to avert an emergency.
- THAW - \$4,500,000 for the THAW LI/EE program.
- Salvation Army - \$4,500,000 to serve households statewide ineligible for assistance from DHS or for whom such assistance is insufficient or not available.

For those grantees receiving less than requested in their proposals, the proportion of funds for direct assistance to indirect costs and overhead will remain the same as in their original requests. The Commission directs the Commission Staff to complete the necessary grant agreement documents with the grantees. The Commission expects that, following approval by the appropriate agencies, the grant recipients will make these additional funds available to low-income customers as soon as possible.

The Commission FINDS that:

- a. Jurisdiction is pursuant to 1909 PA 106, as amended, MCL 460.551 *et seq.*; 1919 PA 419, as amended, MCL 460.51 *et seq.*; 1939 PA 3, as amended, MCL 460.1 *et seq.*; 1969 PA 306, as amended, MCL 24.201 *et seq.*; 1982 PA 304, as amended, MCL 460.6h *et seq.*; and the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, as amended, 1999 AC, R 460.17101 *et seq.*
- b. Grants from the LIEEF should be distributed as described above.

THEREFORE, IT IS ORDERED that:

A. The following Grants for a total of \$41,000,000 are approved:

- Department of Human Services - \$26,525,000 in total. \$20,525,000 for the State Emergency Relief program and to prevent threatened shutoff of energy services and \$6,000,000 to restore energy services already disconnected.
- Downriver Community Conference - \$275,000 for energy assistance to low-income households in the Monroe and southern Wayne County areas.
- Lighthouse Emergency Services - \$200,000 to assist clients in the Pontiac and Oakland County areas who are ineligible for assistance from the Department of Human Services or for whom such assistance is insufficient or would not be provided in time to avert an emergency.
- Michigan Community Action Agency Association - \$4,500,000 in total. \$3 million for low-income direct energy assistance, \$1,000,000 for deliverable fuels programs for low-income households, and \$500,000 to provide a 2:1 match for funds raised locally through the Walk for Warmth project.
- Newaygo County Community Services - \$500,000 to assist clients in a 10-county area ineligible for the State Emergency Relief Program or for whom such assistance is insufficient or would not be available in time to avert an emergency.
- The Heat and Warmth Fund - \$4,500,000 for the THAW LI/EE program.
- The Salvation Army - \$4,500,000 to serve households statewide ineligible for assistance from Department of Human Services or for whom such assistance is insufficient or not available.

B. The Commission Staff shall complete the necessary grant agreement documents with the grantees.

The Commission reserves jurisdiction and may issue further orders as necessary.

Any party desiring to appeal this order must do so in the appropriate court within 30 days after issuance and notice of this order, pursuant to MCL 462.26.
